THE FALLS OF FOYERS LOST.

British Ship Strikes a Rock Off Helgoland and Sinks.

HAMBURG, Jan. 17.—The British ship Falls of Foyers, which sailed from Junin, Peru, last September, for this port, struck a rock off Helgoland, an island in the North Sea, and immediately sunk in deep water. She is a total loss. The crew landed at Cuxhaven to-day.

The Falls of Foyers was a double-deck, four-mast ship of 1,863 tons net and 2,009 tons gross register. She was built of iron by Russell & Co. of Greenock in April, 1883, for the Ship Falls of Foyers Company, Limited, and hailed from Glasgow. Her length was 274.1 feet; breadth, 41.1 feet, and depth, 24 feet. She was last surveyed in San Francisco, in April, 1897. Capt. Pryde was her commander.
